RARA e-mail reflector

If you have visited the RARA web site on the Internet, you probably noticed "e-Mail Reflector" buried among the many options. Well... It's not the longest element of a tribander nor used as a bat to swat SPAM. An e-mail reflector is a program that acts as the forwarding broadcaster of e-mail messages to the names on a distribution list. Here's how it works:

1. One member of the distribution list composes an e-mail message or replies to one.
2. The user sends the message to the e-mail reflector (which to the user usually appears to be name of the list itself).
3. The e-mail reflector receives the message and automatically forwards a copy to each person on the distribution list.

The advantage of using an e-mail reflector is that the distribution list can be centrally managed so that everyone will always have the most up-to-date version.

So what does this do for you? It is a very efficient way to keep in touch with RARA people. An email reflector will keep you informed of all the latest developments. It is self administered. YOU control when and how you receive messages. The messages are screened to prevent off topic items. The RARA Rag comes out once a month - the reflector can be used at any time there's something worth sharing with the membership. In addition, the email addresses are private... not distributed to anyone!

ARRL Atlantic Division Director Elections

The ballots for the election will be mailed by the League about October 1st to all members in the division as of September 16th and the ballots must be returned to the League by November 18th. Bill Edgar, N3LLR

The Atlantic Division should have a team with a proven record of service to the League and to you, the members. Both Tom Abernethy W3TOM and I are running as a team. I am a candidate for the Atlantic Division Director position and Tom is a candidate for the Atlantic Division Vice Director position.

Sidebands – Amateur Radio in the News

The Aftermath of Katrina

This month Hurricane Katrina and its aftermath has gripped the nation and dominated the news. Most major news media pointed to the problems in communication by focusing on infrastructure [landlines and cellular service], and on poor

preparedness among Federal, State, and local agencies. Not many looked behind the scenes to find who, in fact, were on hand to bring basic and reliable communication to assist in relief efforts. Refreshingly, a few news sources did.

The Wall Street Journal was one such enlightened source with its article "Why the Levee Breaches in New Orleans Were Late-Breaking News." The article noted that "the breach was first publicized at 8:14 AM Monday by the New Orleans office of the National Weather Service." It goes on to state that "The source of information for the NWS was ham-radio transmission by the Orleans Lee Board, a city agency. The 8:14 warning was the last one the local office issued before its communications were cut off." [WSJ, September 12, 2005]

In an online editorial on *WXPnews*, the role of the internet in times of crisis was assessed. It was concluded that "the 'Net failed miserably as a means of emergency communications, due to its dependence on electrical power and telephone or cable lines. Luckily, as in previous crises, amateur ("ham") radio operators were able to fill in the gap." [WXPnews, "The Role of the 'Net in Times of Crisis"]

Richard Webb, NF5B, was sleeping on an air mattress in a hospital after Katrina had hit. He was awakened by a doctor who told him a pregnant woman swam in the filthy water to the hospital and needed a Caesarian section to deliver the baby. The hospital had limited emergency power and could not perform operations or even sterilize equipment. Webb got on his radio and contacted a ham who was in the Coast Guard Auxiliary in Cleveland. He worked with web to get a medevac to the hospital. The helicopter arrived in time to evacuate the woman to another medical facility. Webb lives in nearby Slidell, LA, and was summoned to his post at the hospital by its head of emergency management. [The Christian Science Monitor, Barbara W. Carlson, September 15, 2005]

Dennis Motschenbacher, K7BV, who is a marketing manager for the ARRL, watched the television coverage of Hurricane Katrina helplessly. He finally had enough, and the 57-year-old packed his compact car with his ham equipment, food, water, and camping gear, then headed for Mississippi. He joined 700 other ham volunteers who had already set up emergency communications posts. He said "I'm here because of frustration, to be honest... I saw the slow response, and I was overwhelmed." He told his wife "I have to go." [Computerworld, Todd R. Weiss, September 7, 2005]

The following activities regarding Katrina have been reported by the ARRL:

Louisiana ARES Section Emergency Coordinator Gary Stratton, K5GLS, has had some 250 ham radio operators working with the Red Cross and the state's Office of Homeland Security Emergency Preparedness. However, State officials did not allow emergency or other units to enter many areas that were still flooded, and there was still no communication with many coastal areas. Stratton says, until volunteer units can enter the flooded disaster areas "there's no place they can go yet. If everyone who has volunteered came [to New Orleans], we could fill the state. But please hold on, it's going to be a very long time [recovering] from this."

A high volume of family-related requests has slowed the passage of critical tactical and emergency traffic. The Salvation Army Team Emergency Radio Network [SATERN] hams are now on a special frequency to accept and handle these inquiries on the air and via its Web site:

[<http://www.qso.com/satern411/emailfrm.htm>]. Hams also provide emergency communications for The American Red Cross which has established a similar 'Get Info' hotline: 1-866 GET INFO [1-866-438-4636].

Louisiana Section Manager Mickey Cox, K5MC, reported that some other Louisiana ARES teams also are in a holding pattern, awaiting word from relief agencies trying to assess what they need in terms of communication support and where, before they can officially activate. Cox also reported that Richard Webb, NF5B, from New Orleans was on the air from the Louisiana State University Hospital as of Monday [August 29] afternoon during the storm. Louisiana Assistant Section Manager Mike King, W5PY, of Slidell, remains on the air since the storm helping provide emergency communications from a hospital on the north shore of Lake Pontchartrain.

"When all else fails, Amateur Radio works is more than a catchy tag line," says Mark Conklin, N7XYO. "It's a lifeline," he said late Monday [August 29] evening, after being involved in the rescue of 15 people from a rooftop.

Hams also are sending digital, written messages out of the area which are delivered as email to other parts of the country. Using a Winlink system which blends the advantages of radio and internet, the hams are passing messages out for their served agencies. They do not have the ability to receive email messages into the area at this time.

In Alabama, Section Manager Greg Sarratt, W4OZK, reports Amateur Radio SKYWARN nets were active Monday, reporting the severe weather conditions to the National Weather Service (NWS). Sarratt himself handled a volunteer shift at the Huntsville NWS office Monday [August 29] evening. He told ARRL Headquarters that ARES groups throughout the state, and especially in central and southern Alabama, have been supporting communication for local emergency management agencies and the Red Cross.

Mississippi Section Manager Malcolm Keown, W5XX, in Vicksburg, was reported on the air at different times. According to Assistant Section Manager Edwin Franks, AD5IF, Keown was using generator power, his regular antennas are all down and his area has no electrical power or telephone service. Franks also reports that he has been getting requests for information about friends and relatives from people calling him at home.

ARRL Northern Florida Section Manager Rudy Hubbard, WA4PUP, reports his section put together a team of Amateur Radio operators to assist in neighboring Mississippi, once they get clearance to go there. The Florida mutual assistance team will be coordinated through the Florida State Emergency Operations Center.

The Hurricane Watch Net (HWN) ended days of operations for Hurricane Katrina. The ham radio network works in cooperation with the National Hurricane Center, and gathers ground-level weather data during storms. Forecasters use the reports to help fine-tune their predictions of a storm's behavior.

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
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
