## Communicating with the ISS

Can you imagine spending six months preparing for a contact, holding a weeklong space camp for kids and guaranteeing that the only opportunity to talk with the ISS, which is traveling overhead at 17,000 mph will work? And doing this with the knowledge that you will not have a second chance if the first one fails? At the



January RARA meeting, scheduled for Friday January 4<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm, Jim Stefano, W2COP, will tell us about the challenges and rewards associated with communicating with the International Space Station. On more than one occasion Jim has introduced local young people to the thrills working extreme DX on the space station. While they are all familiar with the ease of communicating via cell phone, they were impressed by our ability as amateurs to talk to someone

actually orbiting the earth. His most recent adventure with the ISS involved young girls interested in pursuing careers in engineering and you can learn more about it in an article and video which appeared in the *Henrietta Post* [here](#).

The Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program is a cooperative project jointly supported by NASA, the ARRL, AMSAT and other space agencies. It is designed to enable astronauts and cosmonauts aboard the ISS to talk with classrooms and communities around the world via amateur radio. In doing so it not only promotes interest in amateur radio, the space program, science and engineering but it demonstrates that astronauts and cosmonauts are people too.

The challenges of successfully communicating with the ISS and sharing that experience with the community are formidable. First, it must be visible overhead because communications are line-of-sight (despite not being able to reliably "see" the ISS). Then that pass must occur during the daytime when school age children or other interested parties are available to participate. Of course this all must be accompanied by the appropriate radio equipment, antennas and expertise to make the contact. Jim has overcome these challenges more than once and he will share his experiences with us at the January meeting. Please join us for this interesting presentation from someone with an uncommon perspective.



## Two Kinds of Computer Users...

There are two kinds of computer users: those who have had a hard-disk crash, and those who are waiting for a hard-disk crash. So as a reminder, always back up your radio logbook and other important files at least every month, and of course, take a snapshot at the end of the year too. You may want to download your Log Book of the World and eQSL files, too, depending on how paranoid you are. In the event of – or maybe more precisely WHEN - your computer hard drive crashes, do a save on your LoTW Certificate info TODAY, especially the TQSL-Cert of your station info. (You are keeping track of the 3-year expiration of your LoTW certificate, right?) The only way to generate your LoTW TQSL without going through the entire process from step one is to go into TQSL-Cert and do a save; generate YOURCALL.p12 file, which is the method of moving your TQSL to another computer. Be sure to save the \*.p12 file on a thumb-drive, CD or another computer. Make sure you write your LoTW and eQSL passwords in your PAPER Daytimer; you could have up to five: web logins, log signing, and the \*.p12.



Speaking of the 3-year renewal, the TQSL-Cert renewal is pretty easy, just don't do it while you have a log file queued up to be processed in the system – ask me how I know this! (You will have an opportunity to reload that log with the new certificate.) Once your renewal is all set, you can delete the \*.TQ5, \*.TQ6 and \*.TQ8 files, as they will have the old Cert info and are never again useable. # Scanning Report: True GMRS & FRS Range


Some GMRS (General Mobile Radio Service) and FRS (Family Radio Service) ads claim up to 40-mile range for their hand held radios. That's pretty impressive for 1/2 to 4 watt radios.

The ad at the right from a major retailer's website touts 40-mile range. Let's take a closer look at these claims to see just how true they are. We in the ham community already know the answer. Here are the realistic figures you can count on for these services:

Terrain	1/2 Watt FRS Family Radios	1 Watt UHF GMRS Radios	2 Watt UHF GMRS Radios	2 Watt VHF MURS Radios
<b>Outside Clear Flat Terrain</b>	1.5 to 2 miles	2 to 3 miles	3 to 4 miles	3 to 5 miles
<b>Suburban Neighborhoods</b>	1 to 1.5 miles	1 to 2 miles	1.5 to 2 miles	1.5 to 3 miles
<b>Urban Areas</b>	1/2 to 1 mile	1/2 to 1.5 miles	1 to 1.5 miles	1 to 1.5 miles
<b>Inside Buildings or Malls</b>	1/2 mile or 5 floors	1/2 to 3/4 mile 15 floors	1 mile 20 floors	1/2 mile 10 Floors
<b>Between Buildings or Houses</b>	1/8 to 1/2 mile	1/2 to 1 mile	1/2 to 2 miles	1 to 3 miles
<b>Woodlands, Moderate Vegetation</b>	1 to 1.5 miles	1 to 2 miles	1.5 to 2 miles	2 to 3 miles
<b>Woodlands, Thick Vegetation</b>	1/2 to 1 mile	1/2 to 1.5 miles	1 to 1.5 miles	1.5 to 2 miles


These figures are averages based upon our tests and customer feedback. Your results will vary depending upon obstructions, elevation, terrain, vegetation and building construction.

The curvature of the earth allows for a maximum of 6 miles even in the best conditions. To achieve anything further the units would have to be between mountaintops.



Now as you shop for communications for your family you will know the true range to expect. Want to know more about the various radio services? Then come to the March 1st RARA meeting where I will present an in-depth program on GMRS, FRS, MURS, and other radio services.

## RaRa Rags of the Past

### 20 Years Ago, January, 1993

The topic for the first meeting of the new year was a favorite one, antennas. More specifically, the program focused on getting started with wire antennas, a practical, low cost antenna alternative. The speaker, Dick Witkowski, WB2TEQ, pulled upon his own experience from years of practice at his antenna test facility in Hilton, NY. The venue for the meeting was the new Henrietta Fire Hall location. RaRa's long time license testing specialists, George, AA2FO, and Barbara, AA2CX, reported that ten amateurs got new licenses, or upgraded, at the November testing session. Kay Craigie, WT3P, the Atlantic Division ARRL Director, announced that our own area VHF/UHF specialist, Dave Hallidy, KD5RO/2, of Pittsford, was named to the ARRL's Contest Advisory Committee. RaRa's Winter Fun Fest was announced for February 13<sup>th</sup> at Mendon Ponds Park. A short, but very well written article was penned by the Rochester VHF Group detailing how to get on and work the January VHF contest. From the Want Ads you could buy a Hammarlund HQ-180 from Len Gessin, WA2ZNC, for one-hundred dollars. Chuck Vorndran, WB2OZS, remained a long term commercial advertiser doing business as Vorndran Marine Canvas, Clinton Ave., Rochester.

### 40 Years Ago, January, 1973

Announcing the unusual program for the evening was even then an old timer and popular local amateur, Joe Marsey, W2EMX. Joe, along with Harvey Prace, WB2IUM, put on a Quiz Program not unlike the popular TV shows of the period. The show was complete with lighted flashing signs and two pairs of four nervous contestants drawn from the audience who tried to answer questions that came from the license manual. It was great fun. The 12<sup>th</sup> annual RaRa dinner-dance was announced by Cappy Capauldy, K2UXF, who told us of the February 10<sup>th</sup> event to be held at the Mill Restaurant in Honeoye Falls. After dinner brought "Fun with Dunn" by WHAM's local radio personality, Eddie Dunn, W2ECH. A front page photo showed a surprised Bruce Kelley W2ICE, surrounded by Prose Walker W4BW, Chairman of the FCC's Amateur Branch, and AWA guest Dr. Brittain of AT&T, co-inventor of the transistor, at the AWA conference in Washington DC. The surprise was Bruce Kelley being given the coveted international Houck award for historical preservation. (Note: 32 years later, in 2004, Bruce Kelley's protégée, Ed Gable K2MP, would receive the same award) Haven't paid your dues yet? Get with it says Joan Vogt, WA2YTK. RaRa President Ed Holdsworth, WA2EKR, announced the formation of a formal standing committee to act as liaison between RaRa and Civil Defense. The first committee consisted of Rich Koehn WB2SNA, Bill March WA2CER, Elmer Wagner WB2BNJ and from Civil Defense Marv McIntyre K2ZAA. At the same joint announcement, CD officials named Jim Collinsworth, WB2EDT, as Radio Officer. One of Jim's first duties was to plan the annual Simulated Emergency Test (SET) which was announced in this issue as planned for January 28<sup>th</sup> and included VHF/UHF FM and HF SSB nets. From the Want Ads you could buy a Swan 240 HF transceiver from Tim Magee WB2KAO. Glenwood Sales on Hague Street remained a long time advertiser.

# January VHF Contest (January 19-21)

The ARRL Contest Update for November 21, 2012

NEWS, PRESS RELEASES, AND GENERAL INTEREST

We've just gotten used to the idea of Low Power categories for Unlimited and Multioperator entries in ARRL HF contests - how about for VHF+ contests? Yes, two new categories have been added there, too, beginning with the [ARRL January VHF Contest](#). First is the **3-Band** category in which participants are limited to 100 W or less on 6 and 2 meters, and 50 W or less on 70 c m. This category is just right for those sporting an "all-band, all-mode" rig! To encourage new hams to give VHF+ contests a try without having to buy new equipment, the **FM Only** category allows operation with 100 W or less on the 6 m eter, 2 m eter, 1-1/4 meter, and 70 c m bands. Experienced VHF+ contesters will want to include FM capability to work these new stations. Remember to upgrade your logging software and operating aids to add these new categories well in advance of the January contest date.



**1. Date and Contest Period:** The date will be announced annually by the ARRL but will generally be the third or fourth weekend in January. The contest begins at 1900 UTC Saturday, ends at 0359 UTC Monday (January 19-21, 2013).

## 2. Entry Categories:

- 3.1. Single Operator (spotting assistance is NOT permitted)
  - 3.1.1. High Power (1500 W PEP or maximum power allowed by your Amateur license, whichever is less)
  - 3.1.2. Low Power (200 W PEP on 50/144 MHz; 100 W PEP on 222/432 MHz; 50 W PEP on 902 MHz and higher)
  - 3.1.3. Portable (10 W PEP or less, portable power source, portable antennas, cannot set up at a permanent station location)
  - 3.1.4. 3-Band (6m, 2m and 432 MHz only; 100 W or less on 6m/2m, 50 W or less on 432 MHz.)
  - 3.1.5. FM Only (6m-446 MHz, 100 W or less on all bands)
